From the Rector

During the season of Lent, which begins this month on Ash Wednesday, February 22, we will follow Jesus on the pilgrim way to Jerusalem. We will meet him on the road, preaching, teaching, healing-and will follow him on his journey through town and countryside, guided by scripture, spiritual practice, and the companionship of our faith community. As we travel the pilgrim way with Jesus, giving ourselves time and space to enter into Jesus' passion, may we discover anew that Jesus' journey our journey too, and be transformed by it.

What a relief that we will not travel the rocky road of Lent alone! You and I will have learning guides along the way, and opportunities throughout the 40 days of Lent to come together as a community inside and outside of worship to compare notes, reflect on scripture and our life-experiences, and share the fellowship of Christ with one another.

First, look for an in-home weekly Lenten devotional to arrive in your in-box the week of Ash Wednesday. The devotional, entitled Henri Matisse and the Colors of Lent, will inspire us to explore the Lenten journey through scripture, art, and the life of Henri Matisse, one of the world's most beloved creatives. For those of you without ready access to the internet, hard-copies of this devotional will be available through our church office.

Second, watch for a sign-up sheet in the narthex for our 4 week in-person Lenten study of Brian McLaren's though-provoking book The Great Spiritual Migration: How the World's Largest Religion Is Seeking a Better Way to Be Christian. A study guide will be available to you, and each of our four meet-ups in March and April will include a short video, bible study/conversation, and great food. While our Lenten studies have typically happened on Wednesday evenings, we can choose to meet another day or time, for coffee and bagels on Saturday morning or before church on Sundays. We are free to meet together on any

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day/evening that works for the group. Please share your feedback on time/day on the sign-up sheet.

Finally, on Friday March 24 we will offer dinner and a movie to all comers! This Lent we'll watch the 2017 feature film All Saints, enjoying pizza, popcorn, and all manner of treats! All Saints is the inspiring and uplifting true story of an Episcopal Church in Tennessee that transformed itself from a dying parish to a thriving community of faith by embracing its neighbors, sharing its abundance in new ways, and thinking outside the box.

This Lent let's walk the pilgrim way together as we follow Jesus to the cross and to new life in Him. Join us for Sunday worship, and take advantage of our live and on-line learning opportunities that take place outside of weekly worship. As always, we do better together!

UNITED FOR UKRAINE:

WELCOME CIRCLES

A St. Andrew member, Jenna Neuman, shares her experience below on assisting an Ukrainian family potentially migrate to the United States:

"Natalia has been my pen pal since February 2022. I have grown very fond of her. We found each other on the Global Pen Friends site. She fled from Kyiv to Starogard-Gdanski, Poland shortly after the bombing started. Although she and her daughter and her son-in-law and granddaughter have some normalcy, they feel unsafe there. They are well to the northwest of the border with Ukraine, far too close to Belarus. Their new home is temporary and the war is apt to be long. Natalia asked me to sponsor her to come to the US, but the prospect was too overwhelming.

I called the Ukrainian Catholic diocese in Parma which referred me to Catholic Charities which referred me to Immigration and Refugees which referred me to the Church of the Resurrection in Solon. The US government is attempting to share

responsibility for refugees with Americans. This church has sponsored refugees before, but not under this new Welcome Circle program. Sr. Susan Javorek invited my husband and me to join 17 other people at the initial sponsorship discussion. Some of them met again on January 21 and chose Natalia and her family to sponsor! She is a certified nurse and English teacher. Sergey is a Certified Accountant and his wife Yana has a degree in Economics. Their daughter, Karolina, speaks Polish already and all know English. They are not destitute and miserable, but they are an excellent first attempt. So, the process begins . . ."

A NOTE FROM THE BENCH

Greetings of Mid-Epiphany,

Longing for light, we wait in darkness. Longing for truth, we turn to you. Make us your own, your holy people, light for the world to see.

Christ, be our light! Shine in our hearts, Shine through the darkness. Christ be our light! Shine in your church gathered today.

In the season of Epiphany, we hear a lot about light, and bringing light to the world. This beautiful hymn by British hymnographer and composer Bernadette Farrell certainly speaks to this, and calls us and the church to be the light of Christ to the world. Farrell's hymn reminds us that we, the church, have a responsibility to speak and be light to the world that is so engulfed in darkness.

The first stanza of this hymn especially fits the Epiphany theme in Isaiah 60 read on the Feast of the Epiphany, Arise, shine, for your light has come (NIV).... And from The Messenger Bible, Wake up! Put your face in sunlight! God's bright glory has risen for you. The whole Earth is wrapped in darkness, ... But God rises on you. We hear this theme of light in the Old Testament reading from Isaiah for Epiphany 3, The people walking in darkness have seen a great light; on those living in the land of deep darkness a light has dawned (NIV), and we are called to be a light to the world in the Gospel of Matthew appointed for Epiphany 5. You are the light of the world.....In the same way, let your light so shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify God in heaven (NIV).

Epiphany is also about ministry in the world, and our call as Christians to follow God's word, and become a voice for the troubled and those in despair.

Longing for peace, our world is troubled.
Longing for hope, many despair.

Your word alone has pow'r to save us,

Make us your living voice.
Stanza 2, Christ be our Light

Stanzas three and four call us to social justice, and reflects Farrell's work in social justice as a community organizer in London.

Longing for food, many are hungry. Longing for water, many still thirst. Make us your bread, broken for others,

shared until all are fed.

Longing for shelter, many are homeless.

Longing for warmth, many are cold. Make us your building, sheltering others,

walls made of living stone.
Stanzas 3,4 Christ be our
Light

The fifth stanza seems to pull together this call for us to bring the kingdom of God to Earth as we serve here and now, the people of God right where we are today. We are the church, filled with gifts of the Spirit, and opportunities to use our gifts in many and varied ways. This is who the church is called to be and what the church is called to do.

Many the gifts, many the people,

many the hearts that yearn to belong. Let us be servants to one another, making your kingdom come. Stanza 5, Christ be our Light

We will sing this hymn as we move from Epiphany to Lent. May we all manifest Christ's light in the world, here and now, right where we are today.

May this be our prayer for the church:

Christ be our light! Shine in our hearts.

Shine through the darkness. Christ be our light!

Shine in your church gathered today.

Refrain, Christ be our Light

I look forward to praying this prayer as we sing together!

May it be so.

HUMAN TRAFFICKING

January was National Human Trafficking Prevention Month.

Human trafficking offends the dignity of every human person. It destroys families, communities, and individual lives. The Episcopal Church has a long history of supporting action against human trafficking and working to support the victims of it. We are committed to advocating at the federal level for more action to set human trafficking victims free to live the lives of freedom God intends for them.

Federal lawmakers have rightly made human trafficking a legislative priority. The 117th Congress passed the Abolish Human Trafficking Reauthorization Act of 2022 unanimously. This legislation implements vital provisions to end the criminalization of child trafficking victims. We are grateful for the passage of this important legislation, but there is always more that can be done.

We urge you to both thank the members from the last Congress for passing such an important bill and encourage them to remain vigilant by improving our anti-trafficking laws and providing greater protections to the wide array of individuals at risk of being trafficked.
