# From the Rector: A Future with Hope

Beloved friends,

If it's good to be together, it must be bad to be apart.

And yet: the truth is that life has always been a rhythm of separation and togetherness, exile and return. We may



prefer the "return" bit, the "bring you back to this place" bit, but that doesn't mean separation isn't part of the story.

Experiences of separation are at least as old as the ancient stories of the Garden of Eden, the Israelites' exile in Babylon, and the parable of the Prodigal Son. Jesus and his followers were separated by betrayal and death, and then reunited by forgiveness and newness of life. Even on our most "normal" days, our lives are a rhythm of gathering and dispersing, coming together and going apart, calls to worship and benedictions.

While the COVID pandemic is still with us, we rejoice that we can again be together for worship. We as a church are still recovering from the effects of our time apart and seeking to re-establish patterns of gathering that meet the needs of our community. You are a part of this pattern and we crave your presence.

The pandemic has been another profound experience of this ancient pattern, and as challenging as it's been, we can take solace in the knowledge that our ancestors, too, experienced seasons of exile. And here's the point: thanks to this history, over time our faith — and our church — has been built to help us live through such seasons with grace and hope.

At our core, St. Andrew is a community of reunion, homecoming, and return. Now more than ever, in a world full of exile, our congregation stands as a beacon of hope, welcome, and radical hospitality.

And as we look ahead, please consider praying this giving prayer daily, over the coming weeks. ### A NOTE FROM THE BENCH



On October 1, Rev. Lisa shared many things she

encountered through the week that increased her faith. As I think about faith, I am reminded that so many times I look for the big thing – something that is huge and miraculous that I can say for sure "This is FAITH!"

While big things are wonderful and always a gift, Lisa's homily reminded me that our Creator reveals many things every day (not always BIG things) that can increase my faith.

In the coming weeks we will hear the story of Jesus healing ten people. One (a Samaritan) returned to say thank you for the healing blessing he had received. Jesus wonders why only one returned to praise God -- the Samaritan, an outsider.

In her hymn, "Ten Who Suffered Sought Out Jesus," by one of my favorite present day hymn writers, Carolyn Winfrey Gillette includes these stanzas:

Where are we, O God of mercy? For your Son has blessed us, too. He has given life abundant, offered healing, made us new.

Like the nine, are we distracted by our homes, our work, our play?

Or do we return and thank you, taking time to humbly pray?

Jesus, make us truly grateful for the blessings we receive.
Like that one, may we say, "Thank You!" like that one may we believe:

Give us faith to see your mercy. and through all we do and say, May our lives become our "thank you!" as we follow you each day.

As Winfrey Gillette notes in her book, *I Sing to My Savior*, Jesus' words at the end of this passage are not only intriguing, but they invite us to receive healing, as well as to be grateful. Jesus says, "Rise and go. Your faith has made you well." Winfrey Gillette notes that an expression of gratitude, our "Thank you!" is an essential part of the healing that takes place.

May we approach the end of this church year with gratitude, and may we always be aware of the importance of gratitude in the many blessings we receive – some so subtle that we may miss them.

May Jesus words, "Your **faith** has made you well," remind and invite us to live in faith be grateful for the blessings we receive.
