Jubilee Life

“But if God himself has taken up residence in your life, you can hardly be thinking more of yourself than of him. Anyone, of course, who has not welcomed the invisible but clearly present God, the Spirit of Christ, won't know what we're talking about. But for you who welcome him, in whom he dwells—even though you still experience all the limitations of sin—you yourself experience life on God's terms.”

Romans 8:9-11 The Message

What does it mean to experience life on God's terms? For those who follow Christ experiencing life on God's terms means living life in the sacred space of Jubilee. For ancient Jews Jubilee meant a time of freedom and celebration, where debts were forgiven, lands and other property seized for debt payment were returned to their original owners, and slaves were freed. Jubilee was a time where the fruits of the earth were freely shared and justice reigned. Leviticus 25:8-13.

For African people enslaved by wealthy landowners in the antebellum South, the concept of Jubilee, learned through scripture and shared by word of mouth, became a reality on the day that Abraham Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation. As Episcopalians, the outline for living a Jubilee life is set forth in the words of our baptismal covenant. BCP 304-5. In it we notably promise to “proclaim by word and example the Good News of God in Christ,” and to “strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of every human being.” BCP 305 (continued page 5)

Our Food Pantry partnership with Advent Lutheran Church which provides food to families in Lake and Geauga Counties is turning 10 years old this July, and we're going to celebrate the occasion with a party! On Wednesday, July 17th everyone's invited to gather before (and during) the Wednesday Food Distribution for a Potluck Cook-Out. This is a ministry about feeding the hungry, and what better way to celebrate than by gathering with our Advent partners and Neighbors for food and fellowship. The party starts at 5 PM and will continue through 8:30 PM. The event will feature hamburgers and hot dogs on the grill. St. Andrew and Advent members attending are asked to bring a side dish, salad or drinks to share. Cake will be provided. Even if you are not a pantry volunteer, please come and celebrate! We're all in it together and this is a huge milestone for our important ministry. Last year alone we served over 2000 families providing a total of 63, 891 meals. 43 volunteers from St. Andrew, Advent and the community staff the four food distributions each month. In fact, many volunteers are neighbors and friends of parish members and some have come to us after calling the church looking for a rewarding volunteer opportunity. We sincerely thank all the volunteers who work so hard to make the ministry a success.

All are welcome to come celebrate on Wednesday, July 17th starting at 5 PM. Bring your family, friends and neighbors, or if you know someone looking for a volunteer opportunity, bring them too! It's going to be a fun evening!


Save Me!

How do we manifest Jubilee life at St. Andrew? Certainly through our weekly Eucharistic celebrations, our mutual pastoral ministries, and through the loving life of our community which we enjoy together as we learn, work, and pray God's kingdom into being. But what about the folks who do not join us for worship or other spiritual learning within the community? Isn't Jubilee life something we must strive to share with others?

One particular way that we begin to fulfill our baptismal covenant and manifest Jubilee life as a parish for the benefit of others is by maintaining our Choice Food Pantry, which serves some 7,000 men, women, and children per year, most of whom are not members of the parish. This summer we celebrate the 10 year anniversary of our Choice Pantry Feeding Ministry and our partnership with Advent Lutheran in this sacred work. Through the pantry we truly "seek and serve Christ in all persons, and respect the dignity of every human being." But what if we could do more?

St. Andrew has an abundance of land - land on which a garden could thrive. Such a garden, once developed, could greatly extend our ability to share fresh, healthy food with our neighbors in the spirit of Jubilee. It could also serve as a collaborative learning tool, on issues of the environment/creation care, nutrition, healthy food preparation, resource management, collaborative living-the list goes on.

The creation of a Jubilee garden at St. Andrew would draw volunteers together from our parish, our pantry partner Advent Lutheran, mission-area churches, our food pantry guests, and friends we haven't even met yet who want to garden and are looking for a way to learn or share their learning, and help others. As these groups converge to plan, create, maintain, and harvest the Jubilee garden, relationships are nurtured, stories are shared, people are fed, and together, through our mutual efforts, the new creation our Savior Christ dreamed for us becomes real in our midst by our mutual labor of love. This is Jubilee life, shared!

The creation of a Jubilee garden at St. Andrew is a big dream. It will require us to gather gardening expertise, develop grant funding, recruit volunteers/volunteer coordinators, and work collaboratively with people inside and outside our church. At our recent vestry retreat the dream of a Jubilee garden was born. Shortly thereafter during a meeting with our pantry partners about our upcoming 10th Anniversary Food Pantry Celebration the folks from Advent Lutheran started dreaming with us about a Jubilee garden and creating abundant life together.

How about you? Are you ready to share in this particular dream of Jubilee life at St. Andrew? Do you have gardening expertise (planning, building raised beds, labor skills, plant knowledge) you'd like to share? Would you join with others to write/administer grants for the garden? Do you know how to recruit, coordinate, or support volunteers? Even if you don't have these skills or any interest in gardening, we need your prayers as we discern how best to build a Jubilee garden to expand the reach of our feeding ministry, and include more people in the realization of our Lord's dream of abundant life for all.

Watch for our first Jubilee Garden informational meeting coming in August. It's the beginning of a great adventure, and we're all a part of it!
