#### FROM THE RECTOR

I first discovered John Donne's poem, *A Hymn to God the Father* on a bookshelf at home. I was 11 or 12, I think. I remember that the book was very thin, blue, and oddly shaped, wider than it was tall. My mother was an English teacher who loved poetry and shared that love with me. There were books everywhere at home, of all sorts. I was a spiritual seeker even at 11, trying to figure "everything" out. I'm still at it! This poem from the 1630's had an immediate effect on me. I sensed its truth even as I struggled to understand it. I copied the poem and taped it to my bedroom wall, also blue. It stayed there until the tape turned yellow. I thought of this poem today, in the context of Lent. Doesn't it seem that every negative thought or feeling we experience, those thoughts or feelings that lead to sin (separation from God), originates from fear of some sort; from personal and societal insecurities that block our innate spiritual conduit to the Holy?

Our Old Testament readings in the first two weeks of Lent this year recount God's covenant (binding promise) to Noah, and Abram. These covenants hold fast for us today. On the third Sunday in Lent, we will consider God's Ten Commandments conveyed to Moses, and through Moses, to us. These commandments and God's covenants convey the depth of God's loving commitment to all of humankind.

As we explore the state of our own minds and hearts in relation to our Creator and Savior this Lent, consider how your own fears, whatever they might be, rational or irrational, impact your actions in the world, and rob you of your innate conduit to the Holy. Then think on God's covenants and commandments to humankind (you included) and Christ's eternal love, demonstrated by his life, death and resurrection. Let go of fear. You are the beloved of God and destined for great things in God's time.

I have a sin of fear, that when I have spun My last thread, I shall perish on the shore; But swear by thyself, that at my death thy Son Shall shine as he shines now, and heretofore; And, having done that, thou hast done; I fear no more.

# A NOTE FROM THE BENCH

The Drama of Holy Week Greetings St. Andrew Friends,



As I start to think about the Holy Week and Easter liturgies, I am always struck with their beauty both as individual liturgies, and as one collective liturgy of Holy Week. I'm always reminded that we aren't just remembering what Jesus did 2000 years ago, but that there is a mysterious connection between what Jesus did and what we do today. There is a very close association between Jesus' life (especially in the Passion), and the trials and sufferings we, and the Church experience today. The drama of Holy Week is reflected in the readings from scripture, the homilies,

the music, and the ritual of this Holy Week all of which tell the story of the Paschal Mystery.

On **Palm Sunday**, we begin by experiencing Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem. We hear in the Gospel of Mark, often read at the blessing of the palms, "Hosanna! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord!" (In the Old Testament, Hosanna is translated "Save," something we might say when faced with a danger that we alone cannot survive, and in the New Testament, Hosanna is used as praise and adoration.) Jesus is praised and even hailed as King as he rides into Jerusalem, as we hear in the Gospel of John, "Hosanna! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord! Blessed is the king of Israel!" This victorious entry into Jerusalem sets the stage for Jesus' betrayal, death, and resurrection.

Maundy Thursday is the time of the institution of the Eucharist, the institution of the Priesthood, and the new commandment to love one another, through the ritual of washing feet. Maundy comes from the Latin, mandatum, which is translated, command. Jesus says in John's Gospel, "I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another." This is beautifully described in Bernadette Farrell's hymn, Love Goes On.

Love, our Savior's one command: "Love the way that I have loved you," with a towel and a basin, washing feet with servant hands.

There are three gifts that remain when all other things have perished. Only faith, hope, love enduring, and the greatest gift is love.

On Good Friday, Jesus is tried, condemned to death, flogged, tortured, forced to carry his cross, crucified, died on the Cross, pierced, and then buried quickly with no burial rites required of the Jews. Jesus was not just executed, but was murdered in a way that stripped him of all human dignity, made him laughable, powerless and helpless, through the crowning and being dressed in the robe of a king, and then shamed and tortured through the flogging, beating and crucifixion. The agony of the crucifixion is our sign that Jesus saves us by sacrificing everything. A hymn we sing on Good Friday pulls this together.

Lo, the Good Shepherd for the sheep is offered; the slave has sinned, and the Son has suffered; for our atonement, while we nothing heeded, God interceded.

Ah, holy Jesus, how has thou offended, that man to judge thee hath in hate pretended?
By foes derided, by thine own rejected,
O most afflicted.

On Holy Saturday, we celebrate The Great Vigil of Easter, during which we celebrate the new life of the Risen Christ, breaking the chains of death and rising from the dead. Christ rises in glory and is no longer confined to a physical nature as we are. He mysteriously meets the disciples in locked rooms and breaks bread together as a connection back to Maundy Thursday's institution of the Eucharist. At the Great Vigil of Easter, (which we will celebrate at St. Andrew this year!) the Risen Christ is immediately proclaimed after the lighting of the new fire, and the Paschal Candle.

Leap and spin, you powers of heaven. Burst into explosive songs of joy, all you companies of angels. Let the throne of God be surrounded with the praises of all that has life.

Risen in splendor, He is among us;
the darkness is driven back.

The drama of Holy Week culminates on **Easter Sunday**, the Day of Resurrection, on which we celebrate Jesus' victory over death. We often renew our Baptismal covenant because Baptism is the way in which we enter the drama of the Paschal Mystery. It is through Baptism that we die with Jesus (back to Good Friday), and we become a new creation in Christ through water and the Holy Spirit – the Risen Christ we celebrate on

Easter Day. This concludes the Paschal Mystery with its drama, ritual, music, homilies, scripture readings, and breaking bread together. May we enter our celebration of the Paschal Mystery this year experiencing all these liturgies as one connected event. Dan Schutte (composer of Here I am, Lord), sums up the drama of Holy Week well.

Love's triumphant day of vict'ry heaven opens wide.
On the tree of hope and glory death itself has died!

Join in the dance of earth's jubilation!
This is the feast of the love of God. Shout from the heights to the ends of creation:
Jesus the Savior is risen from the grave!





The Phoenix, a mythical bird, which at death bursts into flames, but rises from it's own ashes symbolizing the resurrection and eternal life. The Fiery Chariot represents Jesus ascending into heaver.

The Epiphany Star finds it's fulfillment in the "manifestation" of Jesus to the Gentiles. (Matt. 2:12)

The Christmas Rose symbol of the Nativity and Messianic prophecy.

TRINITY


BARTHOLOMEW

The dove expresses innocence, purity, The Holy Spirit, and the presence of God. It must always include the three rayed nimbus.

The prominent three leaves, makes the clover an easily understood symbol of the Trinity.

Bartholomew was said to have been flayed alive and is symbolized by three flaying knives.


#### TWELVE APOSTLES & EIGHT FEAST DAYS



THOMAS

PHILLIP

It is said Thomas built a church with his own hands, the carpenter's square is his symbol. The spear of a pagan priest represents his death. A Botonnee Cross and two loaves of bread signify Phillip's remarks when Jesus fed the multitudes John (6:7)



The Ship represents the missionary journeys of Jude

The crossed keys to the kingdom were the Lord's gift to Peter, and the upside down cross is his crucifixion. (Matt. 16:18,19)



JAMES THE GREATER




JAMES THE LESSER

James the Greater is symbolized by the scallop shell of pilgrimage, which represents his zeal of missionary spirit.

It is said that the body of James the Lesser was sawn asunder after a horrible martyrdom.

THE GRAPES AND WHEAT represent the sacrament of the Holy Communion, the Wine and Bread of Life. (Mark 14:22)

#### IN THE SANCTUARY



MATTHEW - WINGED MAN

Matthew's gospel traces Jesus' human genealogy. The four evangelists are always shown as winged creatures

MARK -WINGED LION

His gospel begins "The voice of one crying in the wilderness" suggesting the roar of a lion.



LUKE - WINGED OX

The ox, animal of sacrifice signifies Luke; as his gospel stresses the atoning sacrifice of Jesus.

JOHN - WINGED EAGLE

The high soaring eagle, as in John's narrative, rising to the loftiest heights in describing the mind of Christ.



MAUNDY THURSDA

The Host and the Chalice. Symbol of the Last Supper.

GOOD FRIDAY

The Latin Cross with two smaller crosses represents the Crucifixion, This is the most commonly used form of the cross.



THE CROSS PATTEE



The frames for the shields and the border designs on all the cushions. It resembles the Maltese Cross.



PREI DIEU

PAUL "APOSTLE TO THE GENTILE:

Not one of the twelve apostles. An open Bible with "Spiritus Gladius" (sword of the Spirit) and behind the Bible the sword of the spirit itself:

#### BARNABUS

Included amoung the apostles although not one of the twelve His success as a preacher is symbolized by the gospel.



THE EPISCOPAL SHIELD



Red cross on a white shield with nine white crosses on blue, in the upper left corner to recall the nine original dioceses represented at the first general convention of 1789.



THE BRIDAL CUSHION

Joined rings signify the union of man and woman in matrimony, with the presence of Christ in the Chi Rho nonogram (the first letters of Christ in Greek.)
